ATTENTION

A photocopy of each animal's health papers **does not** have to accompany the entry form. Therefore, it is **IMPERATIVE** that you bring the original health papers with you for inspection upon arrival on the Fairgrounds.

IMPORTANT ARRIVAL INFORMATION

These rules affect all livestock and horses

- A. All **OPEN HORSES (except barrel racers or horse pull)** must enter gate #5 and take a left. Once unloaded, exit gate #5 and then enter at gate #7, follow directions to Horse/Livestock Parking in Black lot.
- B. All **OPEN BARREL RACERS AND HORSE PULL** must enter gate #6, follow perimeter road to Gate #11. Barns directly ahead. Unload at barn. Trailers park around back and front of barns. If not enough room, superintendent will direct you.
- C. All **DAIRY CATTLE** follow Rodeo Dr. near gate #5 which runs along the front of the Fairgrounds between the exterior fence and the railroad tracks. Vet check at barn and then unload. Exit Gate #2 and then enter Gate #7, follow directions to Horse/Livestock parking in black lot.
- D. All **BEEF CATTLE** enter gate #7, follow perimeter road until you come to staging area under the overpass. Attendants will direct you when you can proceed. Vet check at barn then unload. Proceed back down Belle Isle Rd. and exit Gate #11, then follow signs to Horse/Livestock Parking in Black Lot.
- E. All **OTHER LIVESTOCK** enter gate #7 to Gate #11. Take a left down Belle Isle Rd. Beef and horse barns on left. Goat, Llama, Sheep and Swine take a right onto Livestock Road just past the Antique Tractor Tent. Vet check at barn and then unload. Proceed back down Belle Isle Road and exit at Gate #11, then follow signs to Horse/Livestock Parking in Black Lot.

GENERAL INFORMATION

- 1. Entries
 - A. Open class and Youth dairy cattle will be housed in the main Dairy Cattle Center on the fairgrounds. **All Youth animals, regardless of where housed, must use the Youth stall card. Open class and Youth must have separate entry forms.**
 - B. Entry forms are located with this packet or can be downloaded at nysfair.ny.gov .
 - C. **No faxed entry form** will be accepted.
 - D. **ATTENTION ALL EXHIBITORS**
For fire and safety regulations, all barn superintendents are required to have a floor plan of where every exhibitor is tied in. Therefore, the following regulations will be enforced every year.
 - 1. If you are tying in with another herd, you **must** notify the superintendent by **August 9, 2018**. This can be done by directly contacting the superintendent by phone or email. Failure to do so will most likely prevent your ability to tie in where you prefer since the floor plan will be set by then.

2. To ensure that the superintendent is aware of everyone's location, no cattle will be allowed in the show ring if they have not been properly signed in when they arrive.
3. If when you arrive there is an issue where you have been placed, you must notify the superintendent. **Do not** move signs or start bedding in any area other than where you have been assigned. The floor plan can only be modified by the superintendent of each barn.

3. Arrival Procedure:

- A. No cattle will be allowed onto the fairgrounds prior to 8:00 a.m., Tuesday, August 21, 2018. They may arrive between **8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.** on Tuesday. **Any exhibitor arriving after 5:00 p.m. on Tuesday, August 21, 2018 must obtain permission from the Superintendent for their late arrival. Exhibitors who have not obtained prior permission will be turned away and will not receive any refund of their entry and exhibitor fees.** However, exhibitors may bring in their tack and bed down beginning Saturday, August 18, 2018.
- B. All livestock vehicles will enter by Gate 5 (will be the same as used during releases) and proceed up Rodeo Drive (the lane between the railroad tracks and State Fair Blvd.). Starting at 8:00 a.m., the Superintendent's Staff will start bringing trucks through the special "Milky Way" gate to four veterinarian staging areas located between the Dairy Cattle Barn and the Coliseum. No other gates will allow livestock vehicles in and no cattle will be allowed off any trucks without a veterinarian present. Once the cattle are unloaded, checked and walked into the barn, empty trucks can leave via Gate 2 and trucks, with tack to be unloaded, will be directed to the unloading area.
- C. All colored breed cattle will follow the same procedure, arriving between the hours of **12:00 midnight and 9:00 a.m.** on Tuesday morning, August 28, 2018. Please note: No trucks will be allowed to unload tack until check-in begins, unless approval has been obtained from the Superintendents. Exhibitors interested in unloading tack during the day on Monday, 8/27/18 should contact the Superintendents and will be scheduled to arrive at a specific time. The check-in area will be between the Dairy Cattle Barn and Coliseum, so we cannot begin until all the manure, from the first half clean out has been removed. **Any exhibitor arriving after 9:00 a.m. on Tuesday, August 28, 2018 must obtain permission from the Superintendent for their late arrival. Exhibitors who have not obtained prior permission will be turned away and will not receive any refund of their entry and exhibitor fees.** Exhibitors should be aware that arriving during the final hour will mean your wait time, before you enter the barn, could exceed three (3) hours. **Exhibitors showing second half will have an opportunity to bring tack in during the day on Monday, August 27, 2018, by appointment only.** Factors such as size of exhibit and distance from Syracuse, New York will be used to determine those eligible for this. If you are interested, please contact the Superintendent for consideration. If selected, you will be scheduled to arrive at a specific time during the afternoon.
- D. The arrival procedure is necessary so that the veterinarians can check every animal before they are allowed into the barn. This is not something that will be changed in the future and will be considered normal routine.

4. Release Procedure:

- A. The majority of cattle will be released from (midnight - 3:00 a.m.) and (5:00 a.m. - 8:00 a.m.) on Monday morning, August 27, 2018 for Holstein, Red & White and Milking Shorthorn and on Monday morning, September 3, 2018 for the colored breeds. The release will be set-up, as in the past, by the superintendent. Therefore, you must still sign-up at the Superintendent's Office.
- B. The barn will be closed to the public on August 27, 2018 and September 3, 2018.
- C. Any exhibitor who has not removed their exhibit from the fairgrounds by 8:00 a.m., will be required to stay until 6:00 p.m. There will be no exceptions. For exhibitors that show cattle both halves, have multiple loads, or have other special circumstances, please contact the Superintendent so special arrangements can be made.
- D. **Any animals removed from the barn prior to an approved & scheduled release will forfeit their show premiums and face possible suspension from the NYS Fair for one or more years.**

Registration papers of all animals must be available during the time of the show. Signed transfers will be accepted provided the Superintendent checks the papers and collects the transfer, the fee and the registration paper to be forwarded to the appropriate breed association.

5. Trucking and Delivering:
Please note and plan your schedule for trucking and delivery according to the above times. The Dairy Cattle Superintendent will do all possible to accommodate conflicts; especially animals being shown at a competing show which conflicts with the above dates. Permission for late arrival OR EARLY RELEASE must be requested of the Dairy Cattle Superintendent in writing.

6. MILKING FACILITIES:

IMPORTANT:

Dairy Cattle exhibitors are responsible for monitoring their own milk with regards to tampering. Do NOT allow anyone to “look into” your bucket milkers, pails, receiver jars, etc. without prior approval of the Parlor Superintendent. Do not assume it is a milk inspector unless it is verified by the Parlor Superintendent.

Dairy cattle exhibitors have the option of using the "Milk Quarter," the "designated" vacuum pipeline or a portable vacuum pump.

The "Milk Quarter" has 14 tie stalls, milking machines, weigh jars, an in-line cooling system and a 1,000-gallon bulk storage tank. Milk is measured in weigh jars and recorded for each cow before it goes into the storage tank. The facility is operated under strict health requirements for fluid milk and exhibitors are paid for milk contributed.

Milker units will be made available to the exhibitors, using the dumping station area when the parlor is closed and bagging cattle is taking place. Milker units are provided by the New York State Fair for the length of the Fair.

For those exhibitors milking on “the wall”, next to the parlor, the Fair will provide the vacuum, a utensil wash area, a dumping station and milking machines. Milk will be weighed before storage in a bulk cooler and each exhibitor will be paid for milk contributed.

- A. All exhibitors must sign in when using the Milking Facility or Dump Station. Proceeds from milk must be paid to current exhibitor. If a non-exhibitor is to be paid for the milk, their full name, address and social security number must be given to the Entry Department.
- B. Any milk that is not acceptable **must** be disposed of at the Dump Station located in the Milking Facility. **NO MILK IS TO BE DUMPED AT ANY OTHER LOCATION** inside or outside the barn. Exhibitors failing to comply with this rule will face loss of premiums, fines or possible suspension. This practice will be monitored carefully by the Superintendent.

Fluid milk is not acceptable from cows that are:

1. Producing colostrum milk.
2. Producing mastitis milk.
3. Producing flaky milk.
4. Being treated with antibiotics.

Each lot of milk delivered by an exhibitor will be sampled and tested for antibiotics. A positive test for antibiotics will:

1. Require the offending exhibitor(s) to pay for the removal of any tank(s) of milk made unsalable by that person(s)' contaminated contribution.
 2. Require the offending exhibitor(s) to compensate other exhibitors for the value of any milk, which they had contributed to the tank(s) which was/were rejected because of the offending exhibitor's contamination.
 3. Require that premium awards due an offending exhibitor(s) be forfeited in amounts needed to provide compensation for items 1 and 2 above.
 4. Offending exhibitor(s) who have not complied with the requirements of items 1 and 2 above will not be permitted to exhibit at future dairy cattle shows/sales/competitions until such requirements have been met.
 5. If there is a second offense within five years, the exhibitor will be suspended from participating for three years following the completion of requirements 1 and 2.
 6. **Any milk produced during the hours when the Dairy Milking Quarter or Dump Room are not staffed should be disposed of by the exhibitor.**
7. **Dairy Cattle show management reminds all exhibitors that the minimum legal drinking age is 21. They urge any exhibitor(s) hosting a post-show party to closely monitor their guests for the legal age requirement. The management reminds exhibitors that they may be liable in case of accident(s) and recommends that any post-show party be conducted in such fashion as to minimize any negative impressions of the dairy industry by the fairgoing public.**
8. Delivery of supplies will be restricted to between 10:00 p.m. to 8:00 a.m. due to congestion in the area between the Dairy Cattle Center and the Coliseum.
9. Formula for converting Actual Milk Production to 4.0 percent corrected milk.

4.0% FCM = (.04 x lbs. milk) + (15 x lbs. fat)

10. The New York State PDCA has determined that all exhibitors **must** wear white pants, shorts or skirts (with colored or white shirts) while showing in the individual, group and championship classes. Exhibitors will **not** be allowed in the showing without whites.
11. **ALL** medical sharps or medical waste products **MUST** be disposed of properly. Medical waste receptacles are available throughout the Dairy Cattle Center. **DO NOT**, under any circumstances, throw sharps in the trashcans, feed bags or bedding. **ANY exhibitor** failing to follow this procedure will automatically **FORFEIT** all prize money and **WILL NOT BE ALLOWED TO SHOW** at the New York State Fair for **THREE CONSECUTIVE YEARS. There will be ZERO tolerance for such offense. (IF YOU USE THEM, TAKE THEM HOME).**
12. Dairy One, Ithaca, N.Y. will supply a portion of the sample jars to be used in the milking facilities.

DAIRY CATTLE RULES AND REGULATIONS

Original health papers must accompany the animal for inspection upon arrival on the Fairgrounds.

FOR 2018: There will only be one leadsman allowed on the halter in all classes. The ring master has the authority to intercede if the leadsman cannot control the animal.

1. The rules printed herein and the livestock general rules are made a part of the conditions under which all entries of exhibitors are made, and exhibitors are respectfully requested to read them carefully, thereby avoiding confusion at the time of the Fair.
2. Competition is not limited to New York State. Entry Applications are available from the New York State Fair Entry Department, 581 State Fair Blvd., Syracuse, NY 13209 or you may enter on-line at www.nysfair.org/competitions.
3. **Deadlines & fees – see page 1**
4. **Group classes not included on original entry form must be entered no later than the time entries are checked by the Superintendent or her staff. An entry fee of \$6.00 will be collected at that time.**
5. **Animals must show in the class that corresponds with their age. We will NO longer allow animals to show in the next older class.**
6. Radios/players must not disturb other exhibitors and fairgoers. Stations/CDs/etc. must not contain explicit language, profanity, racist remarks and/or offensive material. The volume must be appropriate. For instance, if you are clipping and have it loud enough to hear, it is too loud to others and should be just turned off. The Superintendents have the authority and will confiscate the radios/players if you do not comply with this rule after the first warning. The unit will be returned upon release.
7. Health Certificates cannot be faxed. You must have the original document before the animal in question will be allowed entry into the barn. Fax abuse in the past has led to this new ruling by the State Vets.
8. The use of entry forms for multiple exhibitors will no longer be tolerated. Refer to #19 below under Exhibitors for a definition. An exhibitor is considered the owner of the animal listed on his/her entry form. The name of the exhibitor must coincide with the name of the owner of said animal(s) as listed on the Registration Paper. We have allowed family members to use the same entry form and list the "Exhibitor" as the farm name, but we are seeing names of owners on entry forms that have nothing to do with the exhibitor entering at the fair. Partnerships and other joint ownerships must have a separate entry form from the individual that is part of that joint ownership, who is exhibiting animals at the fair. For example, if Exhibitor A and Exhibitor B own an animal in partnership and each owns animals individually, three (3) separate exhibitors exist. Substitutions are allowed between owned cattle. In **NO** case will it be accepted where an exhibitor can list animals on their entry form that they do not own. An animal entered in such a fashion will not be able to show. There will be no exceptions.
9. **Stall/Entry Fees:** Exhibitors will be allowed approximately 1 panel (10 feet) for every 2 animals present in the barn at the \$6 entry fee. If you entered 10 animals and brought 4, you will be allowed 2 panels, not 5. Every **EXHIBIT** that **BRINGS** at least 8 animals will be allowed one extra panel for items such as clipping chute, displays, tack and/or personal space. (16 animals would allow 2 extra panels, 24 animals would allow 3, and so forth). Hay/straw can be stored in your trailers to bring in on a daily basis or stacked against designated spaces along the wall of the barn.
10. Exhibitors who bring the large square or round bales must work with the Superintendent's office to store the product where it will not interfere with the movement of other exhibitors/fairgoers. It cannot be placed in an area where an aisle or walkway will be blocked. The Fair will provide an area, where the bales can be stored during the fair until needed. A skid steer with a fork will be provided to

move the bales around. This must be done when the fair is closed and there are not fairgoers in the building (between 10 p.m. and 8 a.m. each day).

11. **Tents are allowed in your exhibit if they have a top and only one closed side. At night you may have 3 closed sides, but during the day, only one can be closed. There must be a fire extinguisher in the tent at all times. This will be enforced by the fire marshall and backed up by the Superintendent.**
12. Registration papers **MUST** accompany the animal and health papers when the animal **ARRIVES AT THE FAIR**. We will no longer accept exhibitors' providing the papers after the Superintendent's office has completed checking in. In the past, we have allowed the papers to arrive right up to the show. The authentic physical paper must be provided. Faxed, snapshot and digital copies are not acceptable.
13. There will be only one transfer per animal allowed. We ask that transfers are completed before the fair if possible to reduce the confusion during the show.
14. **Exhibitors are responsible for their own displays.** The area where you house your cattle and tack, including the aisle behind your cattle, will be kept clean, organized, swept and free of debris. Cattle will be clean and manure picked up. The Superintendents and their staff will monitor this. We encourage all exhibitors to monitor each other as well. The appearance of the dairy cattle barn speaks volumes to the fairgoer and a negative opinion is not what any of us want. Exhibitors will receive one warning and if the situation is not corrected, premiums will be forfeited and possible suspension from showing at the NYS Fair will result.
15. **The "Picture Area" for photographing cattle** will be on the opposite side of the barn in the grassy area located outside of the milking parlor (ie; where the old wash racks are located).
16. Animals to be shown, regardless of age, must have been recorded and appear in the name(s) of the exhibitor on the registration paper of their respective breed association. For all breeds, the Registration Paper, signed transfer form and transfer fee will be collected by the Superintendent (for any transfers not yet completed) and forwarded to the respective breed association following the breed's show. The animal will then be shown under the new owner's name in the Show Catalog.
17. Animals owned by a syndicate, firm or farm must be entered and shown exactly as listed on the registration certificate. Animals owned in partnership (each partner being named on the reg. cert.) may be entered in any class of the show under one owner's name or under the partnership name, but must be shown under the same ownership throughout the show. Animals to be shown must be entered in an individual class on the application by name, age and registration number along with the name and registration number of sire. In addition, all group entries to be shown must be listed on the application.
18. The first three prize winners (first five prize winners for Holsteins only) in each class of individual animals for each breed in the junior show will be automatically eligible to enter the open class upon payment of the entry fee. (A Blue Ribbon is required).
19. Exhibitor: An exhibitor is the owner(s) or firm appearing on the registration paper for the entry at closing date. For the purposes of meeting the requirements in all group classes including county herd and for premier exhibitor and premier breeder an exhibitor is further defined as those members of an immediate family residing on one farm and where the herd is one unit. However, each owner must submit an entry form listing his or her entries. In other words, members of a family owning animals must submit separate entry forms, if they want the animal listed under their name in the show book. If the entry is made under the farm name, the animal will be shown under the farm name. **(See Rule #8 above for further clarification.)**
20. We will no longer allow exhibitors of multiple owners to be eligible for Premier Breeder and Premier Exhibitor, unless that multiple owner entered six (6) or more head. A "transfer" of an exhibitor's share of points will not be accepted. The points will be allowed only for the exhibitor as entered. **(See Rule #8 for clarification; i.e.: Exhibitor A & Exhibitor B.)**
21. An entry fee of \$6 will be charged for each individual class or group class except County or District Herd classes. Entry fee must be paid at time of making application. **The fee is not considered a stall fee. There is also a \$2.00 bedding fee per animal due with entry fees.** Due to limited housing facilities, stalls will be allotted by the judgment of the superintendents. Dairy cattle exhibitors with six entries are entitled to one Helpers Pass. For every six head thereafter an additional Helpers Pass will be provided.
22. It shall be the duty of each exhibitor to present his certificate of registration to the superintendents or assistants in order for the animals to be eligible for show. All substitutions and class changes must be in the hands of the Cattle Superintendent **before** the shows except for fresh cows which may be changed from dry cow to milking class up to the time the class enters the ring.
23. At the time of showing groups, the exhibitor must supply the ring clerk with registration papers of the various animals comprising the herd or group. The Superintendent and Clerk will check registration papers in the group classes while they are in the ring. No premium will be paid unless these papers are available.

24. Ring Number - Each class entry will be assigned a catalog number and the exhibitor will be given cards with the corresponding numbers. These cards must be worn in an exhibitor's harness by the person leading the animal at all times while being shown. If lost, the exhibitor must obtain other cards before entering the showing.
25. No animals will be passed upon by the judges or awarded a prize whose attendant does not carry or show proper catalogue numbers for the lot exhibiting. For group classes, the catalogue number of the group shall be carried by the attendant in charge of the group.
26. The decision of the judges shall be final in all cases, except where error, mistake, fraud, misrepresentation or collusion, not discovered at the time of the award, is proven. In such cases the decisions of the Superintendent of the Cattle Department or such referees as she may appoint shall be final.
27. An exhibitor may show as many animals as he has entered in single animal classes, but will not receive more than **THREE** premiums or ribbons. An exhibitor may show only one entry in Best Three Females, Junior Best 3 Females and Exhibitor's Herd.
28. **New York State has established a Show Ring Ethics Committee. This Committee's decisions to not allow an animal violating the PDCA Show Ring Code of Ethics into the Show Ring will be supported by the Superintendent.**

One exception, in order to keep uniformity between New York State shows, we will allow a 1 ½" hair topline. However, when the cow comes to the show ring, if this limit is exceeded, the animal WILL NOT show.

Any artificial means of removing or remedying physical defects or conformation in exhibition animals will be considered as fraud or deception. The management supports the recommended P.D.C.A. show ring code of ethics, which is printed at the end of rules and regulations. All animals giving evidence of such treatments will be barred from exhibitions at the New York State Fair and all fairs holding membership in the International Association of Fairs and Expositions.

In case any premiums should be awarded to an exhibitor on animals shown in violation of the rule at any fair that is a member of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, the Fair Management, on obtaining conclusive evidence of such violation, will immediately request the exhibitor to refund all premium moneys, cups, trophies and ribbons awarded in violation of this rule. Failure on the part of the exhibitor to comply with this request within 10 days will automatically bar him as an exhibitor from all classes at fairs or exhibitions that are members of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions and he can be reinstated only by a majority vote of the board of directors of said Associations.

The Secretary of each fair belonging to the International Association of Fairs and Expositions will promptly report all violations of this rule to the secretary of the association who shall notify all members.

29. The judge may, at his discretion, require any animal to be milked before him in the ring.
30. Upon request of the Superintendent of Cattle, exhibitors shall furnish animals to be used in the Youth Judging contest and parades.
31. A county, district or canton club is one recognized by the respective NY State Breed Association. Members belonging to more than one county, district or canton club are eligible to show in one club only, and this must be the club, which is considered to be his permanent membership. No county, district or canton club may show more than one herd.
32. The Superintendent of Cattle is authorized and empowered to cause the removal from the buildings and grounds of any and all animals failing to meet the health conditions herein specified.
33. The Management assumes no responsibility in case of loss or damage to stock or to other exhibits from any cause, and reserves the right to cause any examination or test deemed necessary to determine the existence of any suspected disease or condition in any animal exhibited. Exhibitor assumes risk associated with, resulting from or arising in connection with exhibitor's participation or presence at the New York State Fair, including, risks of theft, loss, harm or injury to the person, property, whether caused by negligence, intentional act, accident, Act of God or otherwise. Exhibitor has sole responsibility for its property or any theft, damage or other loss to such property, whether or not stored in any courtesy storage areas. The New York State Fair, nor any of their respective officers, directors, employees, representatives or assigns, shall be liable for, and exhibitor hereby releases all of them from, and covenants not to sue any of them with respect to, risks, damages and liability described in this paragraph.
34. Exhibitors **are prohibited from painting cattle's hooves** on the floor. If it is necessary to paint hooves, please do so outdoors or **PROTECT the flooring**. Failure to do so may result in the forfeiting of premiums.
35. Vehicle Parking: A limited number of vehicle parking spaces are available in the Pink Dairy Cattle Parking Lot. This lot is accessed from Route 690 East or State Fair Boulevard. These are sold on a first-come, first-serve basis for \$30.00 each PER SHIFT. Please download form at www.nysfair.org/competitions and mail to Mary Ellen Daino, NYS Fair, 581 State Fair Blvd., Syracuse, NY 13209. These may NOT be available from the superintendent when you arrive. These \$30.00 Pink Dairy Cattle Parking Permits will allow vehicles to enter the lot and follow direction from parking attendant to the designated area.

36. Temporary RV Parking: **PLEASE BE ADVISED THAT THE TEMPORARY RV PARKING AREA IS LOCATED ACROSS THE STREET IN THE PINK LOT (OPPOSITE GATE #4).** A **limited number** of temporary RV parking spaces will be available to Dairy Cattle exhibitors for each shift. A separate check **MUST** be filled out and mailed to Mary Ellen Daino, NYS Fair, 581 State Fair Blvd., Syracuse, NY 13209. **DO NOT** include your temporary RV parking fee or pink vehicle parking fee in with your entry check. **It must be a separate check:** Please download form at www.nysfair.org/competitions to purchase. Campers **CANNOT** exceed 36'. There are a limited number of spaces and will be sold on a first come, first serve basis. Cost is \$150 per shift.
37. Anyone with a permanent connection to a water outlet must provide a Y adaptor. This is especially true for exhibitors installing water buckets. The water outlet must be available for everyone's use.
38. An increasing problem over the past few years during State Fair is the turning on and off of the overhead lights by non-Superintendent Staff. Lights will, therefore, be left on 24 hours per day and the boxes containing the light switches will be padlocked shut. We apologize to the exhibitors that have complied with our requests over the years regarding the lights, however we can no longer allow this service due to the present situation. We apologize for any inconvenience this may cause.

BVD-PI Testing

- All cattle, llamas and alpacas exhibited at NY county fairs or the State Fair must be negative to an approved test appropriate to detect Bovine Viral Diarrhea persistent infection (BVD-PI). The testing veterinarian is responsible to make sure the proper test is conducted. This is a once in a lifetime test that must be reported on the required certificate of veterinary inspection. The issuing veterinarian is responsible for verifying the validity of the test, the identification of the animal and recording the test date on the CVI. If a previous test is not verifiable the test must be repeated.

THE PUREBRED DAIRY CATTLE ASSOCIATION SHOW RING CODE OF ETHICS

History: Adopted by PDCA in March 1969, revised March 1971, February 1977, February 1981, February 1986, February 1988, February 1989, February 1992, February 1993, November 1995, April 2002 and April 2004

- Grooming and Preparation
- Violations: False, Deceptive or Unacceptable Practices
- Exhibitor Responsibility
- Show Ethics Committee
- Violations: Reporting and Investigation

The showing of registered dairy cattle stimulates and sustains interest in the breeding of registered dairy cattle. It is also an important part of the promotion, merchandising and breeding program of many breeders. For these reasons, the Purebred Dairy Cattle Association (PDCA) believes that it is in the best interest of all breeders of registered dairy cattle to maintain a reputation of integrity in dairy cattle shows and to present a wholesome and progressive image of dairy cattle in the show ring.

PDCA endorses this Show Ring Code of Ethics for all dairy breed shows and pledges its full cooperative support for its enforcement to show management, show judges and the national breed associations.

The application of this Code of Ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this Code of Ethics. Dairy cattle exhibitors shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship.

It is recognized that there are certain practices in the proper care and management of dairy cattle that are necessary in the course of moving dairy cattle to and between shows that are advisable to keep them in a sound, healthy state so they might be presented in the show ring in a natural, normal condition. At all times, exhibition livestock shall be treated in a humane manner and in accordance with dairy quality assurance practices so as to protect the health, safety and welfare of the livestock and the consuming public. No person shall present for exhibition or exhibit an animal which he or she knows, or has reason to suspect, is affected with or has been exposed to a dangerously contagious or infectious disease, disease or illegal or non-approved use of drugs, medication and/or prohibited substances or residue.

The position of the Purebred Dairy Cattle Association is that all animals presented for exhibition shall be in their natural conformation and structure, free of any alteration or modification by injection or internal or external administration of any substance or by any involvement in unethical fitting.

Grooming and Preparation

Dairy cattle exhibitions are conducted under standards for evaluating conformation established by the PDCA *Unified Score Card* (1994), with specific breed characteristics taken into consideration by the show judge. In this connection, animals will be groomed and prepared for the judge's evaluation in order to display the animal's natural contour, conformation, performance and mobility. Specifically:

1. External applications of cosmetics that affect only appearance may be used, including by way of example hoof polishes and false switches.
2. The maximum allowable length of naturally growing hair anywhere on the topline is not to exceed 1". Exhibitors will be required to comply with this rule before the animal is allowed to enter the ring.
EXCEPTION: In order to keep uniformity between New York State shows, we will allow a 1 ½" topline. However, when the animal comes to the show ring, if this limit is exceeded, the animal WILL NOT show.
3. Addition of foreign objects, including but not limited to hair or hair substitutes, cloth or fiber, to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body is prohibited.
4. Externally sealing the teat end with a preparation that does not harm the animal's skin is permissible. Natural teat placement will be given preference over artificially positioned teats.

Violations: False, Deceptive or Unacceptable Practices

These practices are violations of the Code of Ethics and will be reported to show management and may be reported to the respective national breed associations:

1. Misrepresenting the age and/or milking status of the animal for the class in which it is shown.
2. Treating the animal, particularly the udder, internally or externally:
 - a. with an irritant or counter-irritant,
 - b. using a device to artificially create or enhance the udder crease,
 - c. using other substances as detected by testing that causes changes in the udder to artificially improve the conformation.
 - d. plugging of teat canal with foreign substances.
3. Surgical or unethical insertion of any matter under the skin or into body cavities, performed to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body (e.g., administration of fluid via a stomach tube or other similar apparatus to fill the rumen), though not to preclude practices required or involved in normal management.
4. Criticizing or interfering with the judge, show management or other exhibitors while in the show ring or other conduct detrimental to the breed or the show.
5. Challenging, threatening or interfering with an ethics committee appointed by show management to monitor the animals on exhibit on the show grounds.

Exhibitor Responsibility

The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter and/or absolutely responsible person (hereinafter referred to as "Exhibitor") for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, milk or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Materials may also be collected by ultrasound and photographic methods and by direct examination of the animal.

The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter and/or absolutely responsible person (the "Exhibitor") to have disciplinary action for violation of this Show Ring Code of Ethics taken by show management, the state in which the show occurs, and/or the national dairy breed association without recourse.

Show Ethics Committee

Each show should have an Ethics Committee. The make-up of this committee should include official breed representatives, representative(s) of show management (e.g., dairy cattle show superintendent, General Manager), the official show veterinarian and Extension representative.

The Ethics Committee will be responsible for monitoring violations of the Show Ring Code of Ethics. The Ethics Committee will investigate the report of any violation and determine the accuracy of the allegation. The Ethics Committee will have the authority to inspect animals and related material to determine if violations have occurred.

Violations: Reporting and Investigation

Complaints of alleged violations can be reported to the breed superintendent, the show superintendent, show management and/or the Ethics Committee.

Before an Animal is Shown

If the Ethics Committee suspects that a violation of the Show Ring Code of Ethics will occur if the animal is shown, and that violation is reasonably well established before the animal is shown, the Ethics Committee will submit a report to show management.

Show management will discuss the violation with the Exhibitor:

1. If, at the Exhibitor's discretion, the animal in question is not shown, no violation will have occurred.

2. If the Exhibitor wishes to challenge that a violation occurred, he/she/they will have opportunity to appeal to the Ethics Committee. If its decision is not changed, the Exhibitor will be denied opportunity to exhibit the animal in question.

During and After an Animal is Shown

All animals are subject to examination during judging. The judge and Ethics Committee are instructed to examine the top five (5) animals in each class closely for violations of the Show Ring Code of Ethics. When a violation may have occurred, a milkout may be called for. This call may be by breed association rule, or by request of an authorized representative of the national breed association, the judge, the Ethics Committee or show management.

If an animal is exhibited and a violation of the Show Ring Code of Ethics is subsequently suspected, investigated, and determined to have occurred, the violation will be reported to the Ethics Committee and show management for action. The Exhibitor will be notified of the violation and the supporting evidence and invited to defend or explain the allegations.

Violations are subject to the disciplinary provisions of show management, the state in which the show occurs, and the national dairy breed association. Sanctions may include any one, or combination of the following:

- Forfeiture or return of awards, prizes, premiums or proceeds;
- Written letter of reprimand to the owner, exhibitor, fitter and/or absolutely responsible person (the “Exhibitor”);
- Disqualification of the exhibition livestock from an exhibition;
- Disqualification of the Exhibitor from the show;
- Publication of offense.

Disqualification may include any or all shows and classes and may be for any number of years.

About PDCA

The Purebred Dairy Cattle Association, Inc. is a federation of the national dairy breed registry associations serving breeders and owners of Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein, Jersey, Milking Shorthorn and Red and White dairy cattle. PDCA and its member organizations promote the added value and profitability registered dairy cattle offer all dairy business owners.

Violations of these policies are subject to the disciplinary provisions of the appropriate dairy breed association and/or show management.

A Premier Breeders' Pennant will be awarded in each breed to the breeder (regardless of ownership) winning the most points on selected animals (not to exceed six) in open individual classes. Each animal must carry the same prefix. A breeder may nominate animals bred by him, but exhibited by others. These animals must be nominated at the Superintendent's office prior to the judging of group classes. (See Rule 8.)

A Premier Exhibitor's Pennant will be awarded in each breed to the exhibitors winning the most points on selected animals (not to exceed six) in open individual classes.

PLEASE NOTE:

The number of places, which receive the premiums listed below, are based on an average of the number of head shown in each class over the past several years. Animals in each individual class, which do not place in the "money", will receive a ribbon and \$5.00 for their participation.

The Junior Holstein Members will receive recognition by stepping forward in line after each class is placed. The 1st and 2nd placed animals will return for their own championship females Division. Juniors must lead their own animals to receive recognition. Rare exceptions, such as having two animals in the same class, death in the family, a broken arm, etc., may be allowed with prior approval from the NY Holstein Association. If a replacement on the halter is approved, the show person must be the same age or younger than the owner.

If Red and White entries are registered in both the Holstein & Red & White Associations, the exhibitor must choose which show they wish to exhibit their animal in. They will be charged one entry fee for the individual breed class chosen.

The Junior Brown Swiss Members will receive recognition by stepping forward in line after each class is placed. The 1st and 2nd placed animals will return for their own championship females Division. Juniors must lead their own animals and must be a current paid junior member of the NY Brown Swiss Association in order to receive recognition.

The Review Committee shall make a minimum of three daily observations of all exhibitors' displays throughout the length of stay at the Fair. Each committee member shall individually rank the top ten displays daily.

On the final day of stay, the display receiving the most total points shall be declared the winner, with the second highest point total receiving second place, the third and fourth highest point totals receiving third and fourth place and the fifth highest point receiving fifth place. In case of a tie, the final decision will be made by the Committee.

The committee members shall base their decision on the following:

- A. General appearance and neatness of the cattle and the exhibit area. (35 points)
 - B. Educational value of herd display to the fairgoer and interaction with the public. (35 points)
 1. Presentation of the dairy industry (displays, slide projectors, posters, etc.)
 - C. Displays - i.e., Cow Signs, decorations, personalized farm pictures and trophies, (not breed association booths). (15 points)
 - D. Timeliness of chores. (15 points)
 1. Are morning chores complete by 9:00 a.m. (alley swept, area clean, cattle washed).
